Picasso anatomy

**Directions:**

For our first Anatomy assignment you and your lab partner are going to create an anatomically correct mosaic portrait. First you are going to skim through magazines in order to find pictures of all of the new anatomical terminology we have been going over. As you find examples, cut them out and put them aside. You must cut out a DIFFERENT piece for EACH term. For example, you may use Jennifer Aniston's "cephalic region" but you still must cut out orbitals of another person from your magazine! Once you have found all of them you will begin assembling your mosaic portrait. You will have to do both an anterior and posterior mosaic to include all terms. When you have completed your portrait, glue it onto a piece of construction paper. **The last step is to LABEL ALL of the pieces you have cut out. Please number each of your labels so you can be sure that you have gotten them all. If it is a body region that is not normally visible, please draw an arrow near the spot that the region should be.** You may use your diagrams from class or the diagrams in your textbook as a reference. If you are unaware of any of the body regions provided, students MUST research the region. **The portrait should be completed on a poster board – allowing you to complete both the anterior side and the posterior side.**

**Grading:**

You will be graded on the following criteria for a total of **75 points**:

- 50 points for having **50** anatomical terms that are shown below.
  - **Grading of labelled anatomical terms MAY be chosen at random.**
- 15 points for creativity
- 10 points for neatness
